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Let us never depart from what sayeth the word of God.

Dear brethren, if you meet with brethren who handle loose talk, or tell tales on other brethren, don't join in with them, lest you become as guilty as they. But rather shame them and kindly ask them not to talk and make remarks about the imperfections of their brethren. If a brother has aught against another, let him do as the Bible says: "Go to them, and them alone." If you regard my advice as unselfish, and coming from the heart, you will obey it. I feel that if you will practice these simple rules, it will help to bring about a great and unbounding peace to our association.

# **PROCEEDINGS**

### FRIDAY SESSION

As a large multitude of faithful believers began to assemble at the Little Angel Church for this, the twenty-third annual session of the Northern New Salem Association, the sky was overcast, as if rain may arrive anytime, yet not hindering the love of God's sunshine from making its appearance in the hearts of His children. As the songs of Zion began to echo in our cars, the brothers and sisters began to greet each other with a nice handshake and a smile of happiness. As if to say, "so nice to see you again," it was hard to realize that it had been twelve long months since we were blessed to assemble together with this great band of God's Holy people.

Elder Maynard Ratliff approached the stand with gladness in his heart, of being able to be among the brotherhood. After expressing his love for God and for each other,

he led in prayer. Brother Newsome - Clerk.

As God was about to shower His rain upon His creation, Elder Hillard Newsome approached the stand in his usual humble manner to preach the introductory sermon. - 7. The Moderator appointed a committee consisting of three delegates from the Little , Angel Church, together with one delegate from each of the other churches, to arrange the ministry for Friday evening and Saturday morning, who reported as follows: for Friday evening 1) Elders: Lacy Justice, Old Friendship Association, 2) Grover Adkins, and 3) Jimmy Dye, both from New Salem Association. For Saturday morning; Elders: 1) Elwood Coronett, Indian Bottom, 2) Bro. Edwin Hay, Sardis, 3) Elder Delbert Sanders, Union, 4) Elder Clifford Colley, Philadelphia and 5) Elder Ivory Sowards, New Salem.
- Called for transient ministers and members of our same faith and order and the following responded: Hiram Adkins, Roy Caudill, Herman Thompson, W. P. Deel, Bill Dumbar and Okie Kent.
- By motion and second, the Northern New Salem Association agreed to correspond with the following Associations by letter and delegates: a) New Salem, b) Union, c) Philadelphia, d) Sardis, e) Indian Bottom, f) Mud River and g) Old Friendship.

- 10. Appointed a committee to arrange the agenda for Saturday consisting of one delegate from each church, together with the officers of the Northern New Salem Association. Committee to meet back at the house at 3:00 p.m. Friday evening.
  - a. By a motion and second, the Association adjourned until 9:00 a.m., Saturday morning.
  - b. Committee met pursuant to adjournment Friday noon and completed its work on the bill of arrangements. Friday's evening session was opened by Elder Lacy Justice, Old Friendship, who was blessed to make good remarks well seasoned with the Holy Spirit, prayer by same. Second was Elder Grover Adkins, New Salem, was well blessed to preach how we ought to sacrifice for the Lord and have faith that God will make a way for us. Third was Elder Jimmy Dye, New Salem. As he approached the stand, singing one of Zion's songs in the midst of this great congregation, came forth his Brother and gave his hand, telling what great things the Lord had done for him and among much rejoicing the services for the evening were closed, with everyone saying, "I am pleased I came."

### SATURDAY, AUGUST 2, 1980

The delegates met pursuant to adjournment Friday evening, at the house, which is large in size, began to fill up with the many pilgrims that had traveled many miles to attend this grand Old Association expressing their love for each other with a kind handshake and a smile of joy. Several of the inspiring songs of Zion were sung, after which Elder Jimmy Dye, New Salem Association, introduced the services. Giving good advice and counsel, begging all to let their lights shine. We were led in prayer by Elder Woodrow Dye, a faithful servant from the New Salem Association.

After brief remarks from our beloved moderator, business then proceeded as follows:

- 1. Called the roll of delegates and marked the absentees. By a motion and second, the committee on arrangements was discharged.
- The Clerk read the bill of arrangements. By motion and second, the bill of arrangements was received.
- The Circular Letter written by Elder Ray Hamilton for our 1980 session was read by him. By motion and second, the letter was received. By the same motion, Elder W. P. Deel is to write a circular letter, subject to approval at our 1981 session.

- 6. By motion and second, the treasurer's report was accepted. By the same motion, Elder Hillard Newsome was appointed recording secretary. He is to have 5,500 copies of the current minutes printed and distributed among the churches according to their contributions. The secretary is to receive \$200.00 for his services. Printer's fee is to appear on the front cover.
- 7. By motion and second, obituaries of deceased members and friends of the Northern New Salem Association are to appear in these minutes. They are to be typewritten and double spaced. A charge of \$10.00 for pictures was approved by the delegates.
- 8. The committee on ministry chose the following Elders to preach Saturday evening and Sunday Saturday evening Elders 1. Glenn Maddox, 2. Joshua Hicks and 3. Paul Adkins, all of the Northern New Salem Association. Sunday Elders 1. Harold Senters, prayer by Forest Osborne, 2. Hillard Newsome, 3. Ivory Sowards, New Salem, 4. W.P. Deel and 5. Baxter Osborne.
  - Due to the absence of the Elders chosen by the committee to preach on the stand Saturday evening and Sunday morning, the above mentioned Elders were chosen to replace them.
- 9. Called on brethren who agreed to attend Union meetings and Associations for the year 1979 to make their report. By a motion and second it was agreed to omit the brethren making their report. Called for brethren who would agree to serve as messengers to our Sister Associations and the following agreed to attend:

- 10. By a motion and second the request of the Antioch Church was granted. Giving the Clerk, Bro. Newsome, the authority to secure a safe deposit box at a bank for the safe keeping of the ledger of minutes of our previous Associations.
- 11. By a motion and second the request from the Family of Love and the Little Ruth Churches was granted. To place the area code number along with the phone number of our ordained ministers and clerks in our minutes beginning after our 1981 session.
- 12. By a motion and second, the request from the Little Rebecca Church was granted to correct item #13 of our 1979 minutes to read as follows:

We, the Little Rebecca Church of Old Regular Baptist of Jesus Christ having met at our regular meeting time being found in full love and fellowship of all members present agreed unanimously to send the following request to the Northern New Salem Association when convened with the Little Ida Church on Friday before the first Saturday in August 1979. "We, the Little Rebecca Church request the Northern New Salem Association to adopt a resolution against members of our churches belonging to secret orders such as Masons, Odd Fellows or any other related worldly organization that is an offense to our sister associations as well as our own brethren." This question has produced friction far too long in our union and we feel it is contrary to our fundamental Christan beliefs and our church principals as we are not to be a part of worldly kingdoms. And farther that we advise all of our churches having such members to rid themselves of any member that refuses to disassociate themselves from such organizations.

- 13. a. The request from the Maggie Home Church was granted by a motion and second, to have the name of Elder Bobby Baker removed from the list of ordained ministers.
  - b. By a motion and second, the request from the Lilly of the Valley Church was granted. Asking that we the Northern New Salem Association, publish Elder Hershell Blevins in disorder and his name be removed from the list of ordained ministers.
  - c. The request from the Little Angel Church was granted by a move and second. Requesting that the name of Elder Irvin Hicks be removed from the list of ordained ministers.
- 14. The report of the committee appointed by the 1979 session of the Northern New Salem Association, concerning the permanent location to hold our future Associations was given. A motion and second was made to accept the report and to retain the same committee for the next year to continue their investigation into said matter. The committee appointed is to meet at the Little Angel Church, 5733 Saltgaber Road, Columbus, Ohio, on the fourth Saturday in November, 1980.
- 15. In answer to the request of the Little Pilgrim Home Church, asking advice, concerning receiving members back into fellowship of the Church after being baptised twice. By a motion and second, we as an advisory council say to the Little Pilgrim Home Church, "That each church holds its own keys and is the soul

judge of its members, as long as it doesn't violate the rules of the Association."

16. By a motion and second, the request from the Little Jewell Church, concerning the removal of item #13 — 3rd paragraph of our 1971 minutes - was granted. As it is conflicting with item #17 of our 1970 minutes. Relating to the receiving of ministers back into fellowship, after having been excluded for preaching with other unorthodox sects and orders and that item #17 of our 1970 minutes be reprinted in our 1980 minutes. The following is item #17 of our 1970 minutes:

The request from the Little Ruth Church "asking for advice on how should a minister who has been excluded for preaching with sects and orders contrary to Regular Baptists Principals can be received back into the fellowship of a Regular Baptist Church." We, as an Advisory Council, say to all our churches that you may restore such one upon strict examination, but not to return to them their credentials until they have been re-examined by a legal presbytery.

- 17. By a motion and second, the request from the Little Jewell Church, concerning the membership and credentials of Bro. Hillard Proffitt was granted. We, as an advisory council, say to the Little Jewell Church, that we accept his apology and grant you the Little Jewell Church the right to receive Bro. Hillard as a member only and not as an ordained minister.
- 18. By a motion and second a committee was appointed to write letters of condolence to our Sister Associations in the passing of their Elders. The following brethren were appointed: Elders Parris C. Tackitt, Hillard Newsome and Ray Hamilton.
- 19. It was moved and seconded that our next session of our beloved Association be held with the Pleasant View Church, 3589 Beat Road, Litchfield, Ohio to begin on Friday, before the first Saturday in August, 1981 and continuing the two following days.
- 20. By a move and second, Elder Rich Griffith was chosen to preach the introductory sermon at the 1981 session of our Association and Elder Savel Combs is to be his alternate.
- 21. By a motion and second, it was agreed to omit the reading of the current minutes.
- 22. By a motion and second, the Association agreed to adjourn to the time and place mentioned in the 19th item.

The Twenty-third Session of this glorious old Association was concluded by Elder Anthony Hamilton, By the moving of the Holy Spirit, he was blessed to cause the hearts of God's people to rejoice in the God of their salvation, to feed the sheep and to water the lambs that bleat around the fold. Prayer by same.

I hope to be led by God to stir up your pure minds and help you to consider some things which you may have passed over lightly.

Brethren, I have thought of many subjects which I felt would be good and acceptable to this association. But I could not settle on them. My mind and heart would always come back to our young children and young friends. I am very much concerned about their welfare and their souls. Satan has so many ways in which to entice our children into doing the wrong things, and I am afraid sometimes we give up without much of a fight. I believe that we could do more to help our young people resist the devil.

Brothers, we as Old Regular Baptists, can not live in a vacuum as we sometimes would choose to do. We might as well face the fact that we live in a changing world. We are no longer part of the world, but we are touched by things that happen in the world, and the world is touched, and hopefully changed by our lives. I realize that God is the same yesterday, today and forever and changes not. We pride ourselves on the fact that we don't change, but is it fact? Or is it fiction? That we don't change. Brothers and Sisters, I contend that we have, and do change, and it is not necessarily bad to change.

Even in the twenty-one-years that I have been in the church that I have seen many changes and expect to see many more in the next twenty-one years if God lets me live that long. I can remember when it was almost unheard of for a Brother to wear a short-sleeved shirt to church. Especially if the Brother was a minister, but now it is a very common occurrence. I remember when it was rare to see carpet on the floors of our churches; now it is very common. In the not too distant past, it was uncommon for ministers to have a television in their homes. Now it is very acceptable to visit our preaching brethren and see an expensive television sitting in the corner. The list of changes is almost endless. Now, let us assume that one of our ministers comes to one of our churches that has carpet on the floor, he drove an expensive car to church and he owns a television set. He is also wearing a short-sleeved shirt. I ask you, has his preaching lost any of it's sweetness because he is preaching on a carpeted floor and wearing a short-sleeved shirt? I think not. I give these examples to show that Old Regular Baptists can change, do change, and on occasion, should change. And these changes are not necessarily evil.

Now, I want to go back to our young people and some of their difficulties. Several years ago, it was common for the head of the house to work long hours to provide for his family. It was also common for the children to work each evening after school and on the weekends, as well as during the summer raising a crop, or in some other way, helping keep food on the table. During this time, the children had a very limited amount

of spare time in which to get into trouble. Now, in many places, especially in and around our larger cities, it is fairly common for both parents to work outside the home leaving the youngsters turned loose on the streets with the devil as their playmate.

You may wonder why I bring this up, God willing, I will be able to show you why it was brought up. I believe that it is time for us to put aside some of our prejudices and bend our stiff necks for the love and well being of our youth of today. I am going to raise a few quetions, I am not going to attempt to give you the answers to these questions. But, hopefully each one that hears this letter, and if it is printed in our minutes, each one that reads it will consider them carefully, honestly, and prayerfully.

1. Are we the Old Regular Baptist Church accepting the responsibility which God

gave us in directing our youth?

Does our responsibility begin at 9:00 a.m. Sunday morning and end at 12 noon? God forbid! I contend that it is a never ending responsibility.

3. Are we as a church doing anything at all to draw our young people away from the

satanic practices and gatherings and into our churches?

Are we, as Old Regular Baptists, being fair with our children and their friends or are we giving them the impression that we don't need them, and worse yet, that we don't want them?

Are we as a church and an association doing enough to teach our young people with the dangers and sorrows of drug usage and associating with drug users, of the loose sexual codes and the terrible personal price for them, as well as for us as parents that may have to be paid, possible for the rest of their lives just for a few stolen moments of worldly pleasure?

Are we as Old Regular Baptists doing enough to show our young people the great joy there is in serving a true and living God? Or are we trying not to overly influence them? I think that it is high time that we as a church and an association use all the resources at our command to influence them away from satan and

toward Jesus Christ our Saviour.

Is there anything that we, as the church or an association, can do to occupy some of their wasted time and direct it in a more constructive manner, or are we afraid to face up to our responsibilities? And are we willingly turning our responsibilities for shaping the lives of our young people over to satan and that without a fight? Do we tell ourselves that there is nothing we can do and hope that we can convince ourselves of that fact? So we can live with the guilt that comes when we see young lives wasted.

Brothers and Sisters, there are many more questions that I could raise, but I hope that you can recognize the seriousness of this matter. I want these questions considered from the church's and association's standpoint, and not as individual parents. I hope that as parents, we are already doing all we can with our own children. But what about our neighbor's children? As individual churches and associations, can we, with an honest heart say that we are doing all in our power to accept our responsibilities in these matters? If we can, I will apologize for raising them. But if some of us have to answer in the negative, I would hope that we will come down on our knees and beg God for some leadership and guidance in this matter. And then take some appropriate action.

Our children are one of the greatest natural joys that we have here on earth. And they are the church of tomorrow, so why don't we help them as much as possible now! If our children get into difficulties with the laws of our land or in an accident, we as parents will spend all that we have and can obtain to ease their suffering. So why not do all in our power to prevent them from becoming thieves, robbers, liars, prostitutes, drug addicts, drug dealers, and all other evil subjects. Why wait until the damage is done before we act? Even God in His Holy Bible says: "Seek me in the days of thy youth while I am near and may be found." We should encourage our young people to come to our churches and feel that they have a right to be there. I fear that sometimes we give our young people the impression that we are better than they, this should not be. Because at one time we were all young and following after satan and his ways. But by our obedience and prayer to God, He heard our cries and by His grace saved us. He established our goings, and put a new song in our mouth, and great joy in our hearts. We should show our young people that this is the greatest prize on earth, and it is within their reach if they will strive sincerely.

Our lives should shine and show forth our love not only for each other, but for all mankind, especially for young people. The children of God are the greatest people on earth and we should also be the happiest people on earth. Let us be caught counting our blessings instead of complaining so much. Give God the thanks, honor, and glory for all things. Let us teach God's way as we go through this life. As the Bible says, "Cease to do evil and learn to do good." Let us be more willing to help our young people cease

doing evil and learn to do good.

Some of you might feel that I have forgotten the church but I assure you, I haven't. But the church is a group of true believers and are already children of God. I am speaking of the ones that have been born again. So why should we worry so much about God's people. I feel that we would accomplish more and would be better workmen for God if we spent more time trying to get the world to repent and less time complaining about minor things that are not essential to the plan of salvation. Brothers and Sisters, I believe that Old Regular Baptists are the most wonderful people on earth, but at the same time we should realize that we are not perfect in all things, I don't believe that children of God go back into the world, but we can err.

I realize this letter is getting a little lengthy, but I feel that I could write much more at this time. Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. I thank my God that I am His and He is mine and when this life is over, I am going Home to die no more.

In conclusion, Brothers and Sisters, let me beg each and everyone of you to show mercy toward each other. Don't dim your light but let your lives shine forth with God's love. May each of us as a church be willing to do battle with the devil for the control of our young people's lives. And remember our young people in this saying: As a twig is bent, so grows the tree. May God help us to be able and willing to sacrifice our own feelings for the welfare of God's church, the Old Regular Baptist. Let us not be ashamed to stand before the whole world and declare that we have had that spiritual birth, and are on our way to Heaven.

I hope this letter meets the high standards of God's people. But if not, reject it. I will still love you with God's Eternal Love, and I will still feel that the Lord of all Glory led my mind in this undertaking. Praise the Lord now and forever!!!

### CONSTITUTION

### OF THE NORTHERN SALEM ASSOCIATION WHEN ORGANIZED IN 1957

From a long series of experiences we, the Old Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the Letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

**ARTICLE 8.** Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

**ARTICLE 11.** There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

**ARTICLE 13.** Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations which shall be by a unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any members, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

Isaiah 45:5, 1st Cor. 8:6, 1st John 5:7

ARTICLE 2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the written words of God, and the only rules of Faith and practice.

2nd Peter 1:21, 1st Timothy 3:16, 2nd Timothy 3:16.

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace. "For by grace are ye saved through Faith."

Isa. 41:1, Eph. 2:8, 2nd Timothy 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23.

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore a Saviour is needed for redemption.

Gen. 2:7, Romans 5:12

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance, and believe in the gospel, and regeneration of the soul, sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none such shall fall away and be lost.

Prov. 8:4, Matt. 9:13, Mark 2:17, 2nd Timothy 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23.

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ. 2nd Timothy 1:9, Luke 18:13-14, Acts 13:39.

**ARTICLE** 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on earth, and the mode is, **IMMERSION** back foremost so as to cover all over.

Matt. 3:14, Luke 1:9-10, John 1:31-32-33, Romans 6:4, Eph. 4:5.

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Saviour, and that by the use of unleavened bread and fruit of the vine and feet-washing should be kept up until His second coming, by His believers.

Luke 22:2-20, John 12:7, 13:7-8, 1st Timothy 5:9-10

- ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and that the joys of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

  John 5:28-29, 1st Cor. 15:51-52, Luke 24:26.
- ARTICLE 10. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel, except such as are regular baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the gospel, and has come under the hands of a regular chosen presbytery of the church and ordained thereby.

  Acts, 12:2-3, Romans 1:16, Titus 1:6.
- ARTICLE 11. We believe it is the duty of all church members to contribute money for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor, according to their several abilities.

  Acts 11:29, Romans 15:26, 1st Cor. 16:1-2.
- ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage, or indulge people in their sins, or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation, is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

Matt. 16:12, Act 8:16-21, Romans 16:17-18, Eph. 4:14-15, Gal. 18:9-10.

- ARTICLE 13. We believe that the church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ, who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and with one another, and have given themselves to the Lord, and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the gospel.

  John 11:8-11, Acts 2:42, 1st John 1:3.
- ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the church, and the government thereof is upon His shoulders.

  Isalah 9:6-7, 22:21-22, Luke 1:33.
- ARTICLE 15. None of the above articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation, so as to make God partial directly, or indirectly, or to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice, and free consent.

  John 3:16, Heb. 2:9.

### RULES OF DECORUM

- ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.
- ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.
- ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interruped in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.
- ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips of imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.
- ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.
- ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association.

- ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.
- ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother."
- ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any members from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of the decorum.
- ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
- ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled. And he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.
- ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.




## LIZZIE JANE MOORE
