
ELDER WOODROW DYE

It is with much sadness and a broken heart that I will try to write this obituary of our beloved father, Woodrow Dye.

In the hills of Eastern KY at Island Creek, Pike County, KY on October 21, 1916 a little baby born was born to the late Lawrence and Alifair Gayheart Dye. Dad was preceded in death by his five brothers and two sisters: Kennel Dye, Bill Dye, Jack Dye, John Dye, Hayes, Dye, Emma Moore, and Hester Dye. His surviving brother is Kelly Dye and sister Julie Caudill.

When dad was about ten years old he and his brothers, sisters, father and mother walked from Island Creek, KY to Spewing Camp, KY. This is where dad grew up to a handsome manhood.

Dad was raised a poor person and had to start working at a very early age. First, dad got jobs hoeing corn from daylight to dark for other farmers at twenty-five cents a day. In the year of 1936 he was chosen into the Civilian Conservation Corp where all his money went home (except five dollars) to support his mom and dad's family.



After a year in the three C's, dad came home. One day while walking up Spewing Creek there were three young women ahead of him. One of these girls caught dad's eye. He told me it was the way she was walking. This woman became our mother. Her name is Monnie Brown Dye. They were married on July 17, 1937. Dad and mom loved each other very much and to this union was born ten children: twins, Nancy Ann and Joann Dye (deceased), Tilton Dye (deceased), Milton Dye of Columbus, OH; Andy Dye, Prestonsburg, KY; Litten "Jimmy" Dye, Price, KY; Ricky Dye, Magnolia, TX; Freda Goines, Printer, KY; Gleda Johnson, Printer, KY; Lucy Reynolds, Printer, KY. These children gave mom and dad 19 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren. These children were dad's life. He loved children and referred to them as God's little angels. Dad expressed his love to them by giving them money, which in turn, they hugged him and smiled for him. Dad knew that our children are what we live for. He did not and would not make differences in his children, but when certain ones came around, I would question that; for example when the babies came to visit.

Dad was a retired coal miner and a dues payer to the United Mine Workers Local 5899 until his death.

There came a time when dad became worried about the welfare of his soul. In 1950 he gave his hand to the Pilgrim Rest church, feeling the Lord had spoke peace to his soul. Dad was a member for 56 years. On March 2, 1953 he was ordained to the ministry. He had been moderator of Robinson Creek church and Little Nancy church, as well as, assistant moderator of his home church. Dad was also a serving trustee of the New Salem Association until his death. Dad loved the Old Regular Baptist and was willing to defend her standards whenever or wherever the need arose.

So in my closing remark I desire to say to my brothers and sisters and dad's grandchildren, you can see him again. The way is there; the way is Jesus Christ. He is the door to eternal life beyond this old cruel world of death, pain, cancer, heartache, and troubles. Yes, our loss is Heaven's gain.

On April 7, 1967, the Lord loaned a dear son to the late Bro. Harlos Hall and Sis. Wanda Hall of Elyria, Ohio. He joined a family of one brother, Tim; and two sisters, Vanessa (Mrs. Wayne Martin) and Sabrina Russell. Many aunts, uncles, and cousins, and a very special niece, Melissa Martin, who came into his life and whom he dearly loved, will miss him greatly.

Eldon was the grandson of the late Elder Jerry and Sis. Tora (Amburgey) Hall and the late Bro. Edd and Sis. Mallie Allen.

He graduated from Elyria High School in 1985, and he worked for Lorain Community Hospital in Lorain, Ohio, for the past 19 years

until cancer took control of his body in January 2006. Unfortunately, God often needs to use tragic events to get our attention.

On May 2, 1998, Eldon's dad died, and Eldon began to stay close by his mom to take care of her. He would take her shopping and do what he could. She had him for 39 years and still called him "her baby." There is no one like a mother to her boy!

Eldon called me his "second mom" and there was no price limit on the gifts he bought for me and others down through the years.

One day my phone rang, and he asked me to meet him in private at a restaurant. Three hours passed, and through tears and pain Eldon said, "I always heard your sins will find you out, and mine have. It hurts me to talk to you, but I am so miserable." He talked about is childhood, of growing up, and of his personal life of sin. No child is perfect; neither are we parents.

Eldon told me that day, "Sis. Marge, I promise you and God, if He will forgive me, I will be saved, someday."

I told him he had to be serious from the heart to be born again; to become a child of God is

about having a personal relationship with God. It is "by grace through faith" that one is saved, "not of works." I told him many scriptures about salvation that day. We parted in tears.

Time passed; the sad news came of his cancer, and he was sent to Cleveland Clinic. We went to see him, but he was so ill and looked near death. He asked Tim if he could speak to me alone.

He told me how close he and Tim had become through his sickness. He told me how Tim and Maryl had taken him and his mom into their home. What a great 24/7 nurse Maryl was to him, so caring and doing so much for him!

He also wanted to talk about his past; he was so scared, so afraid of dying; he knew where his soul would go. He wished he could live his life over. He even asked if I would stay with him all night. He said, "I know you can't save my soul, but I have seen your prayers answered."

I told him, "In my heart I feel you will be saved."

He told me, "I will never stop asking God to save me." I left so broken-hearted, so sad.

On Thursday night, January 26, 2006, the phone rang. I was praying for Eldon to get through. I told the one I was speaking with that Eldon may be saved right then. I got a beep, and it was Eldon rejoicing and thanking God for saving his soul. He said, "You knew it! I know you did! For fifteen minutes I have tried to call you. Now I can call you Sister Mom."

That night Bro. Eldon began to live; it was the first day of the rest of his life for all of eternity. All I could think was "Fly to heaven, white-winged angels, take the news up there tonight." A soul has been born again. Thank you Lord, for his salvation.

He told me, "I have never felt like this before; I can't explain my feelings." The nurse came in and told him he'd have to go to the psych ward. He told her, "No," and smiled, "For the first time in my life I am in my right mind."

The Lord blessed Bro. Eldon to come to Pleasant View Church on April 2, 2006, to publicly profess his faith in Jesus Christ and to follow the Lord in baptism, representing death to his old life of sin, and resurrection to walk in newness of life. He was baptized by long-time friend, Elder Stoney Blackburn, an uncle Elder Conley Daniels and a dear deacon Bro. Dennis Elkins.

Two weeks ago we went to Tim's house to see Bro. Eldon. He smiled so big, and I held his hand; we talked of the past, the good times we'd had. He said, "Sis. Marge, you have always been there for me; you never stopped showing your love for me. I love you very much, and I will be waiting for you in Heaven." His last words to me were such an assurance! Thank you, Lord, that he was no longer afraid of dying!

On July 1, 2006, a band of angels came to take Bro. Eldon home. To Bro. Eldon's family, trust in God at all times and pour out your hearts to Him. His is your refuge. (Psalm 62:5-8). No matter what the circumstances, God is always good!

The family would like to thank all the friends and church family, his relatives and all the ministers, and anyone who helped in any way during Bro. Eldon's illness and during the funeral. He enjoyed life. He loved the outdoors where he could hunt, fish and do things that brought much joy to him and Sister Eunice. For twenty some years he and Brother Eugene Robinette would get together to hunt and fish. When Brother Gene passed away it saddened him for he had enjoyed their time together. But the greatest love of his life was his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. He joined the Little Zion Church on July 10, 1966 and was baptized by Elders Roy Hudson and Covis Tackett. He was a very lively Brother, often heard shouting and clapping his hands in praises to his Lord. God had a work for Brother Clarence and that was to preach His word. The Little Zion Church has lost a very dear member for another bold soldier has died at his post. He wanted to warn men and women about the dangers of living in sin. Which he did as God would bless him. But his favorite sermons were always about the pleasures of heaven and its beauties. I never saw him decline when called to preach. No matter how frail he was he would make the attempt. In this natural life he loved the taste of banana pudding, but when that sweet spirit began to bubble up and overflow nothing could compare to it.

We were blessed to visit Brother Clarence on the Sunday before he passed away, and have a service for him. I believe it was of God because it was the last Sunday he would spend on this old earth. His daughter Jean was so well pleased that we came and showed our love for her dad and mom, she remarked to me later how wonderful it was not knowing it would be the last time. We didn't know if he was able to hear us or not but when Sister Eunice wiggled his foot to see, he stuck his tongue out just like you'd expect him to.

I'll try to bring this to a close but it would be very easy to write a book about Elder Brother Clarence Owens. I didn't say good-bye as I viewed him for the last time in this life; only farewell for a little while till we meet again in the goodly land called Heaven.

Reprinted Items from the 1964, 1970, 1980 and 2003 Minutes of the Northern New Salem Association

Year 1964 – Item 15: By move and second the association agreed to answer the request from several churches touching upon the question of sisters cutting their hair, using make-up, etc. As follows: It is the duty of every moderator of every church to exercise strict disciplinary action toward the violation of established practices. To insist on strict compliance with what sayeth the scripture concerning a woman of righteousness. Mark them that would creep in the assembly just to destroy the peace and salvation of the church.

Year 1970 – Item 17: The request from the Little Ruth Church "Asking for advise on how should a minister who has been excluded from preaching with sects and orders contrary to Regular Baptist principles can be received back into the fellowship of a Regular Baptist Church." We as an advisory council say to all our churches that you may restore such one upon strict examination, BUT not to return to them their credentials until they have been

reexamined by legal presbytery.

Year 1980 - Item 12: By a motion and second, the request from the Little Rebecca Church

was granted to correct Item #13 of our 1979 minutes to read as follows:

We, the Little Rebecca Church of Old Regular Baptist of Jesus Christ having met at our regular meeting time being found in full love and fellowship of all members present agreed unanimously to send the following request to the Northern New Salem Association when convened with the Little Ida Church on Friday before the first Saturday in August 1979. "We, the Little Rebecca Church request the Northern New Salem Association to adopt a resolution against members of our churches belong to secret orders such as Masons, Odd Fellows or any other related worldly organization that is an offense to our sister association as well as our own brethren". This question has produced friction far too long in our union and we feel it is contrary to our fundamental Christian beliefs and our church principles as we are not to be a part of a wordly kingdom. And farther that we advise all of our churches having such members to rid themselves of any members that refuses to disassociate themselves from such organizations. (And not preach with any preacher that belongs to a secret organization.)

Year 2003 – Item 15: A motion was made by Eld. Larry Newsome, second by Eld. Harrison Runyon that we as an adviser and counselor answer the request of the Pleasant View, Eternal Rose and True Vine churches concerning Item #17 of our 2002 Minutes. The following will replace Item #17: "We say to our churches to advise their ministers to refrain from taking any part in the services of churches not in correspondence with the Northern New Salem Association. This means preaching or baptizing members into their fellowship. If this is violated the minister will be silenced for a period of time, satisfactory to his home church. Under no circumstance will this be less than twelve (12) months for the first offense, and if

this should happen a second time he would automatically be excluded.

Concerning funerals: If a family wants a minister of the Old Regular Baptist faith to participate in a funeral service where another church minister (not of our correspondence) is going to take part or be used in part of the services. This is acceptable as long as the Regular Baptist minister separates the services by song, prayer and dismission called. See Item #17 of our 1970 Minutes. This advice is to be printed in our Minutes until future action is taken

CONSTITUTION

OF THE NORTHERN NEW SALEM ASSOCIATION WHEN ORGANIZED IN 1957

From a long series of experiences we, the Old Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations which shall be by a unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent them at any time in the Association; to appropriate money con-

tributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any members, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviates from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

Isaiah 45:5, 1st Cor.8:6,1st John 5:7

ARTICLE 2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments of the 1611 Authorized King James version of the Bible are the written words of God, and the only rules of Faith and practice.

2nd Peter 1:21, 2nd Tim. 3:16

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace. "For by grace are ye saved through Faith."

Acts 15:11, Titus 2:11

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore a Savior is needed for redemption.

Gen. 3:6, Romans 5:12

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance, and believe in the gospel, and regeneration of the soul, sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none such shall fall away and be lost.

Prov. 8:4, Matt. 9:13, Mark 2:17, 2nd Tim. 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

2nd Tim. 1:9, Luke 18:13-14, Acts 13:39

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on Earth, and the mode is IMMERSION back foremost so as to cover all over.

Matt. 3:13-16, John 1:31-33, Romans 6-4, Eph. 4:5

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Savior, and that by the use of unleavened bread and fruit of the vine and feet-washing should be keep up until His second coming, by His believers.

Matt. 26:26-29, Mark 14:22-25, Luke 22:20, John 13:7-8, 1st Tim. 5:9-10

ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and that the joys of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

John 5:28-29, 1st Cor. 15:51-53, Luke 24:46

ARTICLE 10. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel, except such as are regular baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the gospel, and has come under the hands of a regular chosen presbytery of the church and ordained thereby.

Acts 13:2-3, Romans 1:6, Titus 1:5-9

ARTICLE 11. We believe that it is the duty of all church members to contribute money for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor, according to their several abilities.

Acts 11:29, Romans 15:26, 1st Cor. 16:1-2

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage, or indulge people in their sins, or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation, is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

Matt. 16:12, Acts 8:16-21, Romans 16:17-18, Eph. 4:14-15, Gal. 1:8-10

ARTICLE 13. We believe that the church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ, who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and with one another, and have given themselves to the Lord, and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the gospel.

Acts 2:42, 1st John 1:3

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the church, and the government thereof is upon his shoulders.

Isaiah 9:6-7, Ch. 22:21-22, Luke 1:33

ARTICLE 15. None of the articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation, so as to make God partial directly, indirectly, or to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice, and free consent.

John 3:16, Heb. 2:9

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips of imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother".

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any members from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Moderator requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled. And he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.


